Shadow photography transforms ordinary scenes into captivating images. It's not just about snapping pictures; it's an art form that uses shadows as a key component, either as the main focus or to enhance the subject.



f/8.0 1/250sec ISO100 | 28mm

The Terrell Skyspace in Golden Gate Park, officially named 'Three Gems" by James Terrell, is designed to create shadows by admitting natural light through concentric corridors open to the sky surrounding the innermost circular room with an opening at the top of the domed ceiling. Shadows constantly move around the structure as the earth rotates, creating myriad designs. Sitting on the bench opposite the inner chamber door, I waited until this shadow was aligned to create a perfect triangle. Thus ... 'Inner Door Shadow'. Although I favor black-and-white photographs, color is integral to Skyspace and this image. Terrell <u>created</u> Skyspaces installations all over the world. Check it out. There may be one near you.

iPhone 8 Plus

f/1.8 1/4400sec ISO20 | 3.99mm

This photo was taken on a hike in a local forest last March when the sun was low in the sky. I have converted the image to B&W (it was almost monochrome out of the camera) and darkened the darks and brightened the brights in LrC.

f/10 1/50sec IS0125 | 38mm

I had been hoping to capture a current image for this shadow challenge but London has been deluged with multiple 'monsoons" for many days without much sunny respite so I have gone for a picture taken at Wimbledon in July this year. The late afternoon sun caught Dominic Thiem in full flight. I shot at a relatively slow speed to capture some blur to emphasise his speed of movement while the shadow remained rooted. The umpire's chair shadow cast a rather menacing approach from the right. Captured in colour, converted to black and white; edits to bring out B&W contrasts and used the new Lens blur tool to create Bokeh in the crowd.

f/8.0 1/100sec IS0125 | 35mm

Such great photos. I am sorry I have been out of it for a couple of challenges! This photo was taken in Newfoundland back in May. Closest to "shadows" that I can come. I have both shadows and reflections. Yes, it was very cold, and wet. but I loved the angles of the anchors and the rocks at this dock.

f/22 1/80sec ISO50 | 17mm

So many great shadow images! The opportunities that I have had to shoot a new shadow image have been difficult, especially with weather conditions recently. I'm posting an image that is a couple of years old but has some interesting lines and shadows. Driftwood Beach, on Jekyll Island, GA becomes full of shadows as the sun sets to the west, creating long lines from the still-standing or washed-up remains of long-dead trees. This image, shot into the sun created a small sunburst around the standing tree trunks and long shadows appearing to emanate from the base of the tree trunks towards the camera. The triangular shapes from above and from below meet at the base of the trees. A few clouds in the sky add to the angular effect. The camera was on a tripod. Post-processing in Lightroom to transform and enhance contrast as a black-and-white image.

My first entry is of a door on a camper. I had to use my iPhone 11 as I was walking my dog, Zeke. It caught my eye about 30 minutes after sunrise and was probably gone 10 minutes later.

GETTING TO KNOW OUR FEATURED ARTIST:



Brent: *How did you get started in photography? What was your inspiration?*

Peter: My very first camera was a Kodak Instamatic that I received on my Bar Mitzvah, when I turned thirteen. I took it everywhere I went, such as family vacations and school trips. When I went off to college, I bought my first SLR. At that time, I was making slides primarily of landscapes. When I turned sixty in 2012, I bought my first DSLR. My wife and I went to Kenya and Tanzania that year. That trip was the beginning of what I would now call myself - a humanitarian photojournalist. I love to photograph scenes that tell my viewers a story about the world we live in.

Brent: What is it you hope to express to your audience with your photography? What is your strategy for accomplishing that goal?

Peter: *My* hope to express to people to stop and observe all the beauty that surrounds us everyday and not take it for granted. By posting photographs on BootCamp, Instagram, and Facebook, I am able to share my experiences with others.

Peter: I am accompanying Brent to Botswana and Zimbabwe this May. As I stated earlier, my trip to Africa in 2012 was a life changing experience for me. It opened my eyes to realize that people everywhere want a safe place to live, enough food to eat, clean water, and education for their children. In Africa, I was able to combine many different genre of photography that I love - street photography, landscapes, and animals. I look forward to meeting fellow BootCampers and sharing new experiences that await us.

Peter: *My goal is to continue to challenge myself as I continue my journey to find my creative voice.*

Brent: What inspires and motivates you to continue taking pictures?

Peter: What inspires me is to keep taking photographs to ultimately find my " Creative Voice". Through comments from BootCampers and watching videos from David duChemin and Mitchell Kaneshkevich, I have learned to look at the world from different viewpoints.

Brent: Tell me about the funniest shoot you've ever been involved with.

Peter: The funniest photo shoot I did was when my family took a trip to Brazil. Our first stop was Rio de Janeiro. One evening we saw a performance of local dancers. At the end of their show, they invited people in the audience to come up to the stage and dance with them. My two boys went up and had a great time that I captured on my iPhone.

Brent: How does your featured image make you feel? Tell us about this image.

Peter: Back in November, I was driving through a local National Wildlife Park, when I saw this majestic tree in the middle of a field. As it was late fall here, all its leaves had fallen to the ground. I came back a few days later with my camera to try to capture some midday shadows. The bonus was the starburst at the top of the tree. What drew me into the scene were the leading lines cast by the tree's shadows, which then took me to the silhouette of the tree, then on up to the star burst of the sun on top. As I gazed at the tree, it made me pause to wonder about what the tree had seen and observed in its lifetime.

Brent: How do you educate yourself to improve your photography skills?

Peter: I continue to educate myself by watching videos created by the aforementioned photographers. In addition, I listen and learn from the critiques of my fellow Boot Campers.

Brent: What is the most challenging photo you've ever taken and how did you overcome those challenges?

Peter: I find street photography challenging from the standpoint of trying to be respectful, following cultural rules, and creating photos where the people look natural and at ease. I have included a photograph of a girl from India. I asked permission to take her picture, overcoming my fear of stepping outside of my comfort zone.

Canon 5D Mark II

f/8 1/250sec | 32 mm

I am a bit late joining in this challenge as I have been happily traveling around Japan for the last 3+ weeks. Exhausting but amazing in so many ways. Wonderful to see so many creative and diverse images for this challenge - very inspiring. I have submitted one of my favourite shadow images, taken a couple of years ago in La Spezia, Italy. We were on an early morning walk to the market and the winter sun was low in the sky so long shadows were everywhere. I particularly liked this image of the cyclist on her way along the shopping street, with a "glow" showing around her hair and the accentuated shadow trailing behind. The B/W version seems to be more appropriate despite some warm type colours in the original image.

A very modern desert hotel. I know I posted from this place before. For this challenge, I am using their walkway, which proved to be an irresistible shot for me at the time, as I thought it sooo clever. Sony A6000 f/6.3 1/1600 sec ISO100 | 34mm

Hi all, I took this shot in Broome Western Australia on our lap 2.5 months ago, my wife Vicki was on the second Camel & I was waiting for the Sunset! It looks like it will fit the brief.

I was bringing in some clean laundry to our bedroom and there were shadows coming in the window. So, I dropped the laundry basket and went for my camera. This is what I got. I did get the laundry put away. ;-), adjusted highlights and shadows, and ran through Topaz AI.



Sara, at first glance, I thought I was looking through your blinds. When I enlarged the scene, I realized that the shadow of the trees was on the blinds. Very creative!

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




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
